Brenda's Pastoral Report 2013

This is the annual report for the year when we celebrate Cityside's 20th birthday. I pause to give thanks and to celebrate the goodness of the past 20 years, and all that Cityside has meant to me and so many others. As Adee said once in a previous Annual Report – Cityside is a taonga. There's a team of wonderful Citysiders who have been working on our celebrations, which will be on the weekend of 7/8th September. There was a time in Cityside's life when our community felt quite fragile, uncertain whether or not we were viable. This 20 years is a good milestone and I hope you agree with me that we are now a community that has a sustainable and strong life, and a sense of future. This makes it somewhat easier to move on in my own journey away from Cityside, confident in what will emerge for this church over the coming years.

Cityside would not function without a vast horde of volunteers and a handful of paid staff who keep aspects of our life ticking over.

This year, we had a change of admin staffing from Mikey to Fergus, Jeannie has continued her voluntary financial admin, Ian did great work on the property and then stepped down, Hyunsil has done endless rostering and children's space admin tasks, Kirsten has continued the wonderful work with our children, along with the dedicated children's space co-ordinators, and Nicki, Helen, Michelle P and Hyunsil have continued to walk with love and energy alongside our oldest children – some of whom turn 15 this year. And this is not to mention all those who are 'on' the rosters, helping with services, children, and providing morning tea etc.

Deep gratitude to you all for your care and service.

We have an ongoing need for a caretaker/housekeeping person who will look after the smaller-scale physical maintenance and safety of our building. This has been advertised as a voluntary role with travel reimbursement, but no takers yet. Some things are falling through the cracks due to this gap in our staffing.

We have been well served by a large and highly skilled and insightful Council for the past couple of years and I'm thankful for Mark, Fergus, Helen, Nigel, Grant, Kona, Craig and Luke for the work they've done. They have had some big stuff to handle along the way, including my change of role and pay, a big scary financial burden, and most recently my news of transitioning to the Anglicans. They have handled all this with grace and intelligence. Thanks especially to Mark for the extra workload of being the Chair. Cityside agreed last month to split the role of Council into two new groups: a Management Team dealing with organisational nuts and bolts, and a group of Community Leaders, responsible for the 'human' and big picture stuff in our community life. I'm looking forward to working alongside this new format, and believe it will serve us better in terms of keeping awareness and momentum towards those things that are important to our church's functioning and thriving.

The Curating team that plans and curates our morning worship has bedded in well, with some people taking some time out and some new curators. We've had some lovely services with much nourishment

for mind and heart. In addition to our usual church year feasts and seasons, and services built around the lectionary gospel texts, some of the themes we've explored this year have included Waitangi, reconciliation, the Cosmic Christ, love and fear, fair trade, Matariki, midwinter, the work of our hands, and letting go. The curating team is a wonderfully creative and thoughtful group of people, who put a lot of themselves and their heart into our gathered worship and prayer. My thanks to Fergus, Julianne, Kirsten, Karen, Evelyn, Derek, Adee, Christina and Sarah J for their involvement over 2012/3.

Something that I introduced since our last AGM is the 3rd Sunday of the month contemplative communion. My intent with this was for us to share communion more frequently, in the conviction that this is what holds us together in Christ and in community with all our differences. I also wanted to explore having a service that is mostly liturgical, predictable in form, multi-sensory, and chant and silence based, and where we engage with the gospel text at a heart level. Being the person who always curates these services, I can't say for certain how they're going, but I've had positive feedback and I enjoy offering them.

There are many threads to the weaving of our Cityside life – what happens on a Sunday is only one part of this. I really appreciate Jo for her consistent compilation of the 'cityside bits' email – even from afar. I often get one or two email responses from far flung people after the bits goes out, just making a comment about something that's been advertised, or saying 'hi'. There are many people who receive the bits who are not part of our 'attendance' community at Cityside, and often these are the people who most appreciate reading about what's happening. Now that Jo's doing the formatting of community notices, I'm able to give a bit more reflection time to what I write, and I hope that the weekly ponderings and resources are sometimes useful to people in their personal faith journeys, as well as keeping people informed about stuff that's happening in Cityside and in wider networks.

Julianne continues to provide space for contemplative prayer, with the 9.30 Sunday sits on the 1st and 3rd Sundays (with Mike RM and Murray as regular participants, with a few irregular ones) and also facilitating the 3rd Wednesday contemplative evenings. She's recently started advertising these evenings using the online 'meet-up' tool and has seen renewed interest through this. Kirsten and Mark host 'Contemplation and Conversation' once a month in their home, the Mangere Bridge people do a weekly 'Silence southside' and are looking at developing their common life further, the Monastics still meet in Adee's home, the Science and Faith group that Vince co-ordinates have covered some fascinating ground, and the playgroup has continued to meet fortnightly.

This year, Nicola and Mike have faithfully met most Thursday evenings in the chapel to pray – mostly for Cityside people and situations. This hasn't taken off so far to become a larger group, but I really value their consistent and loving prayer and commitment.

We've had some ups and downs with our property this past year. Our commercial tenants gave notice in November, and in February we installed a new tenant who stayed just a few months before notifying us that he didn't get his immigration visa and had to leave. Ian handed over his property management role to me after having done great work tidying up a lot of our contracts and improving our recording of

tenancy payments – for which I'm very grateful. One of our larger storage tenants left after a protracted and nasty period of non-payment and hassle, and happily one of our existing tenants has expanded his storage into the vacated area. And even happilier, we now have a new tenant in the upstairs studio/office area who is operating an artist collective from that space. We blessed Damaris in her business and vision in July, and her tenancy began on 1 August.

I was grateful to be released to attend a retreat at Easter this year that was a significant time for me, and was one element in a process of exploring Alexander Shaia's framework for engaging with the four canonical gospels as a transformative path of spiritual practice. Since Easter, this exploration has deepened to include consideration of the rhythms of the Christian year set within the cosmos and the cycles and seasons of nature – as we experience them in the Southern Hemisphere. Cityside has hosted a couple of events around these ideas, and I personally have found the material and relationships that are emerging with others on the same journey to be very worthwhile. I have already been introducing liturgical elements from the Easter retreat into our Sunday morning practice at Cityside, but there is much more to share.

This year I have slowly been preparing material to support a new stage in our life as a community – the baptising of our teenagers who want to make a step forward in their commitment to the life of faith. The plan is to have two regular baptismal services – one in Spring, one in Autumn – each year, and for anyone (adults included) who wants to be baptised to go through a process of preparation and learning beforehand that I will facilitate. It seems likely that the first baptism will happen in November this year – or shortly after Easter next year.

Before the end of this year I have three weddings coming up — one of which is from within our community (Nicki and Neil), the other two being friends who are not Citysiders, and not within any faith community. I find it a privilege to work with couples who aren't Christians to develop a marriage service that honours the sacred, and which includes prayer and blessing, (my non-negotiables as a religious celebrant) but that doesn't use language that is alienating or foreign for the couple. I also took the funeral earlier this year of a woman also from outside the church, that I journeyed with in the last years of her struggle with MS. Again, a deep privilege to offer a funeral of hope and reflection to people who have a personal faith with Christian elements, but who are well outside the institutional church.

Also in the past months I have introduced to us to a model of community life and belonging that I've called 'travellers, companions and pilgrims.' I am deepening in my conviction that the future shape of the church will need to be a dynamic interplay between the celebrating/gathered community, and smaller, localised, groups that are sharing life on the ground with daily rhythms of practice and engagement. I think there need to be more and different ways of 'enfleshing' the faith that gives us life, and these threads need to be loosened from the 'Sunday service' model of church into a myriad of different clusters and networks and communities that affiliate together. I personally believe that the 'institution' still has a place, but its role is to hold space for the numinous and for stories and celebration, to resource, care for, teach and deepen, those smaller groups that are doing life in a transparent and permeable way in close relationship to the wider community around them. The

'travellers, companions and pilgrims' model is my way of imaging this model for us as Cityside. A group of Citysiders has met together to explore what the 'pilgrim' element of this path might look like for them. This is a significant paradigm shift even for those of us who have been part of Cityside for a long time, and I've often struggled for ways to try to describe what is still vague in my own mind. But still, I have hope for what may emerge — and if this isn't 'it', I hope that in time something else will be.

It's been delightful to welcome some new people to Cityside this year, and thanks to Helen who organised the dinner where we were able to get to know some of them better. What a wonderful grace to have these people bringing their gifts and insights and 'selves' into our community life. I'm conscious that we haven't had our membership renewal service as usual this year, when we would normally welcome new folk. I'm still pondering the whole membership thing. More later.

Cityside's life continues to unfold in relationship to other faith communities. I very much enjoy our connection with Ponsonby Baptist, and the developing tradition of an annual shared service. We still have a loose sense of connection with St Luke's Remuera, that I hope will grow stronger over the coming year. From time to time we pray for our partner church in Christchurch – Oxford Terrace – and Evelyn has taken up the challenge of co-ordinating the mosaic artwork that we will send to them for their 150th anniversary as a gift of friendship and support.

I have struggled (more than usually) this year with the wider Baptist movement of which we are a part. There are a number of factors that contribute to this, but most pointed has been the handling of a Baptist response to the marriage redefinition legislation. The process has been poor, with a consistent lack of acknowledgement that there could be a Christian position that accepts marriage for same sex couples, and a failure to engage in anything but quick and superficial theological reflection on the issue. And, there has been some disappointing undermining of the freedom of individual Baptist congregations to seek their own conscience these kinds of issues, within a diverse movement. I know that we won't necessarily be of one mind at Cityside about the question of same sex marriage, and over the coming months I'll be seeking some feedback about how the church wants me to proceed should I be asked to celebrate a wedding for a same sex couple. In the meantime, together with some like-minded Baptists, I've been in a process of protesting to the Baptist leadership about the process that's unfolded so far, and trying to put forward an alternative viewpoint to the majority Baptist position, so that more than one perspective is aired in public discussion. It remains to be seen just how far this issue will go in terms of censuring 'dissenting' pastors and congregations, or removing people from celebrant status.

Finally, my own 'personal' year as Cityside's pastor... I've been so grateful for last year's decision to pay me full time in my role and to review the housing allowance. This has allowed us to buy our home, in a neighbourhood where we feel a sense of connection and friendship. I have been planting trees, we have a family pet, and Emerson has started at the local school with friends who live just around the corner. Irredeemably middle class aspirations perhaps! But to me they speak of a kind of stability, groundedness and sense of place that help me to be well and from which I can care for others. In the midst of all this settling, there's been the quite unsettling question of vocation. The way I have come to describe it, is that having resolved for a time the question of making 'home' in terms of place and neighbourhood, I

have also needed to explore 'home' in terms of vocation. Cityside is a home for me, but the wider Baptist movement is not. And I don't just mean political hassles, but deeper questions of church life. I am inexorably drawn, it seems, towards a more sacramental expression of worship, and towards the 'being-hood' of 'priest' in relation to the church and the wider world. There are many dimensions to this – too many to go into here. Suffice to say, my decision to proceed with the discernment process with the Anglicans and eventually to decide that my future lies with them and not with Cityside beyond the end of next year, has nothing to do with being dissatisfied with Cityside. It's just turned out to be the next step for me in a journey...and one that I didn't have any intention of taking this time last year!

I'd like to encourage us all into the coming year of reflection, discernment and transition. I hope that it will be a special and graced time for us as a community. I'm sure it will have its challenges and difficulties. But I hope it will also be an affirming time, that will draw people together, and ignite in us a deeper trust and faith in the God who is calling us on. Let's commit to a process that draws not only on our skills and intelligence and experience, but that also involves creative approaches to listening for the voice of God in our midst.

Children's Space Annual Report 2013

The Demographics

Cityside currently has 59 children who are aged up to 11 years old, representing 29 families.

Of the children who come fairly regularly on Sunday mornings:

- 36 are part of the ten55s (Years 0-6 at school)
- 12 are part of the 2to5s group (2-5 years old)
- 3 are Under2s.

On Sundays at Children's Space, we usually have between twenty to twenty-five primary-aged children and around ten pre-schoolers.

What we've been doing and why we do it

- connections with God and each other - story-based - relational - practice based -

The aims of Children's Space are:

- To give children opportunities and skills to develop their own relationship with God
- To develop and use approaches that reflect the special character of the Cityside ethos
- To support children's spiritual formation within their family and at home
- For the children to build strong relationships both with each other and with the church community as a whole
- To cater for a wide range of children's needs, and to respond to changing needs and concerns

Some of the ways we meet these aims are:

- Creating white spaces in our times together, opportunities for children to encounter God unfiltered and at their own pace, and to respond to the text or story of the day in their own way
- Intentionally teaching a range of spiritual practices
- o Telling the stories of the Bible, famous spiritual people and Citysiders
- o Encouraging discussion and questions, even those we acknowledge we cannot answer
- o Intentionally teaching children about why we do what we do at Cityside and about the church calendar year, and how they can join in and be part of what we do as a whole church community
- Offering a range of creative contemplative response activities for all ages involving different senses. Providing a range of response stations to the ten55s to cater for different stages of development and learning styles and flexible grouping of children.
- o Making links explicit between what we do and talk about on Sundays and our weekday lives
- Giving children things to use at home, such as the Lent challenge, prayer kete of objects to prompt prayers and 'Communion at Cityside' book
- Over time, ensuring that the arc of our curriculum covers the key teachings of Jesus and the Bible
- Making opportunities for a wide range of Citysiders to be involved with the children to build relationship, so that our children feel connected to the whole community of Cityside, rather than just Children's Space, for example offering a range of ways to be involved in ChSp and family events that all Citysiders are invited to join in with

- Social events outside of Sunday mornings for the older children, that they can also invite their friends to (this is the new Connect Group for Year 4-7s - it has been lovely to see the positive impact Connect has had on the deepening of relationship and engagement on Sundays as well)
- Providing activities to support children at times in the Sunday service they may not be able to engage actively in: colouring clipboards, books in the service, toys and games available during morning tea.

The topics we have covered over the past 18 months are listed after this report if you are interested in perusing further.

A challenge

I feel very strongly that we at Cityside need to ensure that our children are closely connected to the whole community of Cityside, not just to their own family and the adults who lead ChSp. I believe it is these wider connections that will make the difference in only a very few years when these children leave the shelter of the organised 'programmes' and are wondering whether Cityside is still their home. Relationships need intentional and long term nurturing by all of us. You don't need to know every child, but every child in our community does need to be known by someone – someone who notices and is glad that they are part of us and conveys that to them.

My challenge to every Citysider is to talk to at least one child every time you are at Cityside (parents – your challenge is to do this with a child who is not related to you!). Short and sweet is perfectly fine – simply say hello, find out their name and remember it for the next time you see them, or ask them just one question, maybe about what they learned about at ChSp, or what their favourite response station was or get them to show you whatever they made, or if you heard about a social event in the notices or Bits they might have been to, ask them about it. If you are too shy to talk with them, smile at them when they come into the building at the beginning of church time so they know that they are seen and welcomed.

And another challenge

We have an population bulge at Children's Space, which goes from the current 10 year olds down to the 2 year olds. As the eldest nine children of this cohort leave primary school at the end of the year, the need has arisen to relook at how we structure what we do with our children, so as to make best use of our people resources, both voluntary and paid. Brenda is leading a discussion process around this over the next couple of months.

Children's Space Co-ordinator August 2013

These are things that we have focused on at Children's Space over the past 18 months:

- Term 1, 2012: Lent, Easter, St Patrick, Jesus' time in the wilderness, Harvest, Passover/Seder ritual,
 Centering Prayer, Bead liturgy.
- Term 2, 2012: Resurrection Encounters, Making a Difference (David, Daniel, Joseph, Te Whiti O Rongomai and Tohu Kakahi at Parihaka, Andrew Stroud and John Britten, Suzanne Aubert, Heather MacLeod, Sir Edmond Hillary, hearing from Citysiders who make a difference – Nettie, Andrew, Jared, Nicola), Gratitude body prayers, Body Lord's Prayer.
- Term 3, 2012: Who is Jesus? (The real man, light of the world, the bread of life, the good shepherd, healer, includer, the resurrection and the life), Psalms – word pictures for God.
- o Term 4, 2012: Creationtide, All Souls/All Saints, Advent
- Term 1, 2013: Places Jesus Hung Out (up mountains, lake scary places, at celebrations, peoples' homes, with outcasts, with the sick and needy, with friends), Lent, Seder Meal, interactive meditation, Centering Prayer
- Term 2, 2013: What is...? (What is church? What is the Bible? What is communion? What is a Christian?)
- Term 3, 2013: What is prayer? The Wisdom of Dr Seuss (God's presence in easy and hard times, God's faithfulness, that we are all worthy of love and belonging, what love is, being willing to understand difference, gratitude practice), Lord's Prayer, Prayer kete - collecting objects to prompt prayers.

Community Responses

What makes Cityside my home?

It is the safest community I have found that allows for collectively exploring our own individual understandings and expressions of Christian spirituality.

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

Over the past year I have felt more satisfied with the weekly services, where as in previous years I have sometime found some services were sometimes a bit hit and miss. Though this may be a reflection of my own sense of feeling more at home within the Cityside community than I felt previously.

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

I have often heard Christians from outside the Cityside community express their understanding of cityside's role to be providing a space for Christians to heal, mature, and explore after becoming disgruntled or burnt out by previous church experiences.

I personally like aspects of that description, and I do think it is a need within our wider church community, I feel like current role for the church is to provide a space and community for people who have already journeyed through this process, and are in a more settled life situation.

In what areas would I like Cityside to be developed?

I would like to see Cityside begin to develop a more outward reach, both in terms of providing a space for a new generation of exploring or 'disgruntled' Christians, as well as looking into the wider needs of the Auckland community, and sharing the resources we collectively have with those more vulnerable members of the local

What makes Cityside my home?

Everyone is so real here i.e. uses their own words to talk about their spiritual journeys. The space for creativity. The mixture of so many elements from all corners of Christendom; contemplative communion, Hill Song, The Lion The Witch And The Wardrobe, Bourgeault... The lounge vibe!

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

A shift towards a more, um, reflective/contemplative - sorry can't find the right word here - shift in thinking and disposition, less cynical angry burnt out evangelical stuff. More food at morning tea. All plusses, really. If I had a magic wand I'd use it to sort out - what seem to be - ongoing property, furniture, laptop and other housekeeping issues.

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

A place and community which can help to resource those who want somewhere spacious to practice Christianity, whatever that means to us and the great thing about the spaciousness here is that there is plenty of space to figure that out.

In what areas would I like Cityside to be developed?

I'd like to see us engage with the Bible, more frequently and more deeply, acknowledging that it's a hard book in many ways, wrestling with it as needed, sharing what is speaking to us at the moment - maybe this has changed over time for some of us.

I want to thank all of you for being so open to me having a go at everything here and being open to the ways in which I can contribute, giving me the practical assistance I need to do that without taking tasks out of my hands.

What makes Cityside my home?

In one sense Cityside is my home because quite some years ago I made a decision that it would be and ever since have assumed it to be true. What drew me to Cityisde back then, and still does today, is the freedom to be where I happen to be on my spiritual journey and to be part of a group of people who are seeking to find out what it means to be a follower of Christ in our time and place. It is home because of the relationships I have with fellow Citysiders and the sense of being part of a caring, sharing community despite the shortcomings of our geographical spread.

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

In no particular order, as they come to mind and without grouping them into plusses and minuses:

How much the children are growing up!

Less contributions from other Citysiders in the services under the new curating model (that's a minus for me)

Some new faces, including a few closer in age to me.

How Citysiders have responded generously financially to the move to having Brenda employed full time.

How much Mark and Kirsten contribute to the life of Cityside.

I am sure I will think of a few more once I have pressed the submit button...

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

I am not someone who naturally thinks in this framework. I am much more attuned to what we offer to one another and I see that as having a flow on effect as to how we as individuals function in the world. I recognise I am not entirely comfortable with the idea of churches proclaiming themselves to have roles and ministry in the world unless it has a different feel and motivation from what I have come across so far in other churches.

I do believe we continue to offer a safe place for those who no longer find themselves fitting into the expectations of some other churches and we offer a place where people can come aside and take time and space to heal. Where people can stay on the journey as followers of Jesus instead of drifting away. I consider this to be a hugely valuable and significant contribution but I don't imagine that fits with what was intended for this question.

In what areas would I like Cityside to be developed?

I wish I had plenty to contribute to this section but alas it is not an area where I readily have ideas. But I will eagerly await to see what ideas others put forward and what resonates with me.

What makes Cityside my home?

Cityside is a community I would like to call home.

I love the synthesis of ancient traditions and modern / local (Maori) traditions

Is there some way that Cityside could be transferred to the Anglican Auckland Diocese? The whole community feels and acts far more like an Anglican community than Baptist...

What makes Cityside my home?

I've been a member (& absentee member) for probably 16 years. During the several years that we lived outside Auckland you guys have always treated Brenda & I as part of the family, so that's how we feel. After returning to Auckland we 'shopped round' a bit to see what other Christian communities round the city were doing, but concluded that Cityside is still our tribe.

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

Because we haven't been back long I don't feel very qualified to see things 'in depth', but Cityside seems to be in really good heart as a community. There are a lot of long-standing, caring, family-like relationships here. Coming back I've noticed that the style of service is more liturgical, perhaps less spontaneous than in the past, but that may just be a rose-tinted memory. :-)

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

I'm not very clear on this - probably because we're still not really involved in things, only coming occasionally. Certainly the church seems to function well at supporting and nurturing its members. Whether it's reaching out much as a community to the world around I'm not sure, though definitely many individual Citysiders are doing that through the work they do in their own lives. So in as much as Cityside nurtures that energy & spiritual/personal growth, then Cityside is reaching out through us.

In what areas would I like Cityside to be developed?

I'd love to see a much more indigenous flavour to our worship. Cityside leans quite heavily on Celtic spirituality - I think we need to find a Southern hemisphere language, more grounded in our own soil & soul.

Cityside services can be a bit too introspective & individualistic. Too many 'stations' & not enough prayer or discussion circles. More opportunities for interaction would be good.

Further Comments..?

I'd love to see us talk to God more directly. Most prayer at Cityside is either formal, liturgical, or indirect. I'd love us to talk with God as if he really was in the room with us, and not somewhere far away. Jesus used the word Abba (daddy) when talking to God, and taught his disciples to do the same (of course God is mummy too). Our words are important, as they create our reality.

We could really do with some new or different songs. Part of Cityside's mission statement (as I recall) was to engage with contemporary culture. I'm not suggesting Hillsongs or any of that (please, no!), but some of the old ones that turn up feel tired & old-fashioned - musically very conservative.

What makes Cityside my home?

The people. There are people in the Cityside community who know me well enough that I can connect in easily and without masks.

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

There seems to have been an increasing flow of new people - this is good, but I'm not sure they are staying in great numbers (which might be fine, or maybe its a lost opportunity....)

The meeting of significantly increased financial needs has been impressive.

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

Cityside occupies a precious niche - a community where those who are engaging in a more mysterious, a more open-ended, a less dogmatic, a less triumphalistic kind of faith can continue the journey together. It has has significant 'artsiness' in its DNA - this seems to ebb and flow. It has had significant antiestablishment-ness in its DNA. This seems to be ebbing (which is fine by me). It has taken on the role of being a refugee camp in the past and to some extent this vibe hangs on. I don't like some aspects of that but i get why it has been like that.

In what areas would I like Cityside to be developed?

I would love Cityside to find ways of sharing our experience and providing inspiration for others on similar journeys in Auckland and beyond.

Practically, I would like to see long term decisions made to put our community on a sound financial footing. Whether that be radical redevelopment of the building, or leaving the building entirely for a more cost effective physical space. This is probably a medium term thing as these kind of things aren't easy or quick changes - and perhaps the next wee while isn't the right timing....

Would Cityside consider changing the nature of its 'christian-ness'(?) to articulate an even more openended place for faith? I'm not sure what Citysiders really think about the extent of their christian-ness but it would be interesting to keep exploring the edges.

Maybe multi-faith engagement could be an avenue of interaction....

What makes Cityside my home?

The first thought that comes to mind is that it's simply the people who make up Cityside that makes it homely. For me there's a sense of belonging due to the time I've spent involved with the community and

that sense is primarily relational. I don't have a sense of affiliation with a brand or a church per se. We're just a group of spiritual strugglers; flawed and failing, and I like that.

I'm involved in a few different things associated with Cityside, but very little of which is spiritual formation aside from discussions with people. For that, the Contemplation and Conversation group has been very valuable. Thank you to all those who have been present for that and for sharing that part of your journey with me.

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

At times I have the sense that the numbers of people around on a Sunday morning aren't huge, though at the same time I've seen many new faces and we are often short of seats in the main space - so perhaps Sunday attendance is up and I'm not terribly observant! It's been great to get to know some new people and wonderful to have their contributions to the life of Cityside.

Children's space has been once more very rewarding to be part of - you are a truly wonderful bunch of children!

The Connect group has been an unexpected joy to be part of – and I reference the comment above. Further though, there's been a lovely energy within the Connectors and the group has nurtured an increase in relational depth for those who participate. I've been surprised and delighted at the excitement and the willingness to come as regularly as people have been.

I've not stayed in the service much on Sundays (once? twice perhaps?) due to child related commitments, so don't really know what flavour the services are taking theologically. In a wider vein though, my impression is that the curating group is growing in experience and depth which is certainly a plus. Thank you to Brenda for the intentionality, wisdom and care in nurturing this group.

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

There was a time that Cityside was described as the last stop for the disillusioned; that people who were fed up with church based Christianity had somewhere else to try before giving up entirely. Somewhere that was comfortable with questioning; somewhere that could cope with ambiguity, uncertainty.

I think our role has moved on somewhat, but I do like that idea of Cityside as a sanctuary, as a haven for spiritual seekers within a Christian tradition. I like that we embrace the questioning and can cope with people not having all the answers. I also value our ability to be accepting and to hold within us a range of stages on the journey.

I see our ministry simply as ourselves. To continue honestly and humbly along the path to closer union with God; to encourage other, and to reflect the truth that we have found.

In what areas would I like Cityside to be developed?

Personally I'm exploring a deeper relationship with God and understanding of the Holy Spirit and would really like if there was some way this exploration could be done alongside others. How that can work outside of the Sunday mornings space I need to investigate.. as has been noted elsewhere, there are many of us who are time poor so communal aspects can be difficult. I'd like to look at ways that we can be in community while continuing our lives. This is perhaps along the lines of the suburban monastic sort of idealism which Brenda is initiating with the pilgrim discussion. I'm not sure where to take this yet, and need to continue to develop the practicalities of it all.

It would be nice if we could reach a level of maturity in which we felt comfortable leading retreats, seminars, talks and generally undertaking some sort of outreach and involvement in which we can share the practices and understanding that we have found helpful. I myself am not at this point in my journey so this is just a wistful pondering. I think that we as a community have developed some wonderful things, and it would be great to find a way to share.

I appreciate that I'm allowed to think outside the traditional religious box, and this is not condemned as 'odd' or 'hypocritical'. I appreciate having a place where my children can learn about religion in a thoughtful, creative, open way.

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

The biggest 'plus' for me in the last year has been that I have really come to value the Sunday morning services. My current job is very demanding, so I appreciate the Sunday morning routine of having some quiet, structured time to re-focus, and get my head and heart refreshed. I don't have much time to contribute myself, but I really enjoy the space that Cityside offers, and the gift of 'time out' that the children's program offers me.

The biggest 'minus' for me in the past year was (surprisingly) the message that Brenda sent to the children about what it means to be a Christian. It contained a great generic message at first about remembering God etc., then went on to say that Cityside was, in particular, a Christian church, and what

that meant was that we believe Jesus was something special etc.... (sorry can't remember precise words). The letter brought into focus for me that I no longer believe in the traditional message of Jesus, so I'm not sure whether the label 'Christian' should apply to me, and it made me question whether I 'belong' to Cityside, if Cityside wants to position itself as a 'Christian' church.

I feel worried that at the membership renewal time, I can't legitimately stand up and say that I am devoting my life to following Jesus. Does this mean I will never be in the 'inner circle' at Cityside? Does this mean that I shouldn't contribute? What is the meaning of 'membership' if those words don't count all that much?

I do wonder whether I need to look for another spiritual home, where Jesus is less of a central figure. It would be at great social cost to my family, but I do not want to offend people who want to keep Jesus at the core of what they do.

The current way I handle this tension is not to contribute much, except when my contribution can be 'vague' and perhaps reference 'God' rather than 'Jesus' specifically. But this tension does worry me.

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

I personally would love to see Cityside take on a greater role at providing a spiritual home for those who no longer believe in the Jesus message. To become a place of spiritual nourishment, without needing to adopt a Christian flavour. I know so many people who have left "church" because they don't believe in the Jesus story, and they are now the poorer for having no other place to be nourished.

Could we become (overtly and proudly) that place of nourishment for those who feel they are post-Christian? And spawn many other communities to become post-Christian communities of faith, which better address the spiritual needs of our modern world?

When we were in the US, we spent time at a Unitarian Universalist church, which I personally found incredibly refreshing. A whole organisation which had the structure and community of a church,

(including a denominational support network), but which did not require the Jesus story to be central. The stories, songs and messages which nourished the community were drawn from many traditions.

I wonder if Cityside could become a church like this?

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

Big Plus - all the new people - yay to you people.

Also all the many pluses I wrote above.

A few minuses - often lack of real person to person connection especially outside of services (often unavoidable due to geography and modern pace of life- hence the pilgrim discussions).

Lack of corporate church outreach to the needy/vulnerable - and perhaps to the needy/vulnerable places in ourselves. Are we primarily a place of refreshment that helps keep us all together so that we can function the rest of the week? This is probably a good needed thing - I know I often need it! But is there more to 'church'?

We respond well to the needs of individuals/families in our midst, but do we respond well to needs brought to us about the wider community? Not always - but perhaps we are all too exhausted from the often heart centred jobs that many of us have mon - to fri to want to engage with these needs too? Is it easier to engage with injustices overseas than it is to engage with local ones?

I find this sad but understandable.

I have noticed that I am finding the need to distance myself from the more 'talking' based services (although these are so helpful too to help connection and to help 'heal' faith), and to

instead engage more with ones that help to connect us all in the silence instead, and via Communion and ritual.

I love the idea of ritual as it's a contemplative space that almost anyone can potentially engage with. I therefore deeply appreciate Brenda's contemplative communion services and stuff like Julianne's movement prayer last week. I deeply value silence, and am engaging more with this, but I am also aware that it is not something that everyone, whether because of physical, intellectual, or emotional reasons, can engage with - so I value the ritual being part of our community life - particularly movement prayers that take in the whole body, and Communion (another 'body':)).

How do we engage with people who are radically different and who have quite different ideas of social manners etc? Fear? Discomfort? Allowance? Need to control? Need to let go? Is Brenda or a social worker the only one who is to be seen as being capable of 'dealing' with 'this'? Do we need to 'deal' with 'it'???? What do radically different people bring to our community - what gifts is the Creator giving to us through them? What gifts can we give? What are fears to be listened to, and what are fears to be let go of?

What do I understand Cityside's role and ministry in the world to be?

A spiritual refuge of acceptance, space, and chance to hear in the silence/ritual, and a chance to talk things through to reform/heal faith so that it is more real in the modern world.

Hopefully to grow out of this can grow new counter-cultural ways of being in the world - e.g being more connected with each other - phoning each other up, helping each other out etc.? Or even just becoming aware of what our barriers to doing this is valuable in itself.

But if not - it is a valuable resource for people to re-form their faith so that it can actually make sense in the context of the modern world we live in and a great (liberal?) spiritual refuge of ritual, loving silence (where this is possible), and support for people to then go out to minister Christ's love in their jobs the rest of the week. Which is also great stuff I think.

In what areas would I like Cityside to be developed?

I am letting it be what it will be. My attempts to peel back on busy-ness may lead me to engage more in the church in my local area every other week or so. But I really value being able to connect in ritual, contemplativeness, open-heartedness (liberalmindedness?) to help me take that back to any local endeavours I may have.

What makes Cityside my home?

There are people at Cityside who I can be myself with - they know me and see me and love me anyway. This trust has taken many years and much time and intentionality to develop, and it is something that I value highly. I've been a Citysider almost half my life and it is quite simply my turangawaewae – my place to be.

I love the ethos of Cityside - the acceptance of where I'm at and what I'm exploring and where I'm journeying, and the freedom to do that. The wisdom and generosity of others when they share their stories about how they do life. The willingness to talk about the hard stuff, and to be vulnerable and real. The range of spiritual practices and theological ideas that we engage in, and the deep spirituality, pondering and wide reading that informs so much of what happens. The creativity. The contemplative bent. The permission to think and question and participate and lead. The intentional embracing and nurture of all that.

In the last year, what have I been noticing (plusses and minuses)?

Plusses

It might just be me and the changes I've noticed in myself influencing what I see at Cityside, but over recent times I see many green shoots that have pushed their way up through the cracks in the hard stuff. I see that the flavour of the questions has changed for many people. I see we are a very different group than the Cityside of a decade ago. Someone recently said to me that they thought Cityside is dark and cynical. Maybe we still are, but I think also mixed with the ability for more of us to look for the sparkly bits, to laugh at ourselves a bit more and even to dance a little inside. I see that the emphasis for many has shifted from looking at what is being rejected and moved away from to what we want to embrace and grow towards.

Contemplation and Conversation. Julianne's Centering Prayer services.

Discussion of Brenda's letter and responses to it

(direct comments/questions in italics)

I commend Brenda for her thoughts and allowing us the chance to respond to them.

Brenda: Is our model for church too individualistic. Are we shaped by the Gospel and it's call to us as a community as a corporate lifestyle. Deeper shared response to life.

There are challenges to this. Historical and current. We've had a focus on resources people to be sent out into the world, but as individuals. People are being driven further out geographically (due to cost).

Am committed to being part of cityside more. This is less as an individual and more involved in relationships.

Q to B: could that sense of connection be fulfilled outside of cityside? B: it's an integral part of what Christianity is, so need to see it at cityside in some form.

Agreed that we are missing something in our gathering. We need to be here and be present with each other.

Can we clarify: is this about our corporate expression of our worship or our individual response? We have a shared community where we live (includes citysiders). Church is an important part of our life. Are we talking about coming together physically and doing things together? Our focus is local so we couldn't commit more.

B: its about a model that starts with relationships. Choices about where we live. How we serve alongside each other. Not this virtual thing (sunday) if it doesn't have deep connections for what else is going on. Christ calls us into connection in our shared rhythms of life. Possibly more clustering of lives. A restlessness of ourselves and our church. Is 'going to church' just turning up on sunday. Want to get beyond this.

See the church (broader) in crisis. We need to question 'what is church for'.

Q: Do you have models which influence this?

B: monastic models. But how do churches foster this and do corporate worship. Church worship, meeting and local rhythm of life.

Q: Are there things we can do to change what we do on sunday to facilitate this? Cant see what the solutions are to overcome geographical challenges

Online community is a big part of my life. We could use this more. Citysides reach is far greater than who is in this room. Can we make more of an effort to have more of an online presence and support each other through this. Finances is an issue so can open this up for donations.

Monastic group has a deep grounded spirituality journey together and runs through to sunday connections. Is this a place in your heart shift or is there a response we can give each other on a sunday?

There is a thread and desire for community and connection. Timing might be an issue to bring this about at the moment. It's a timing issue.

This church has a unique opportunity on a sunday to be involved in the service and to share of ourselves. There are people who have other spiritual groups and communities they are involved in. Some don't want to connect to citysiders in geographical ways.

Is pay one of the key issues here? Is Brenda being paid enough?

What does it mean to be a christian in today's world? How should we live?

I struggle with the sunday morning model. Have stopped finding sunday morning being a resource at all. Geographical challenges have always been an issue, even with other churches. Local groups don't always work as it's more about relationships not about the area. So may not connect with people in your area. How to share rhythms outside of sundays with the corporate community. What binds us beyond sundays?

There are 3 threads here. We have high expectations for what church is. For most of just getting to church is an awesome achievement.

1. Brenda's career. 2. Brenda as pastor, 3. What is church
Do we need to let you be free from the mechanics of being a pastor? Does the pastor role
need to be someone who isn't overwhelmed by things like (family, finance etc). We don't
have to solve the pastor thing to answer the church questions.

Time to get back to basics about what is faith? Is this just an evaluation of these things?

Q: Could these yearnings be answered by us being able to support a housing and location relocation. What is Andrew's response to this?

B: not sure about first question. Maybe neighbourhood stuff would answer restlessness. Second question, would need to talk to Andrew.

Some people are quite relationally connected and some aren't. That is normal in any church

community. We want leadership to be connected and holding ideals of community. How can we assist Brenda to be relationally connected?

Feel like we've failed Brenda. How can we address this?

Support the idea of putting a donate box on the website. Some creative ideas were in the annual report for how to support Brenda better (each of us give money?).

Wanting to see Cityside to be more interconnected. As our commitment to Cityside we need to identify purposeful ways of connectedness. To be seen as a core value. Commit to this community and commit to this value.

Sensing a value of connection theme coming out of: we are being together but for moments of our lives for refocussing, reconnecting. This is important as we work out the meanings of our lives somewhere else. We get together to scatter. We come and go under this umbrella of shared faith, doubts and visions. Seems a willingness to share with brenda an exploration of where the church can go. Hear a sense of uncertainty about how people can be part of this.

Derek/chair: Two main questions / and responses:

- 1. Where are we at as a community, where could we be going, should we stay where we are, are there other visions we should share?
- 2. Do we have the right arrangement for Brenda's role and employment (currently 80% role) *Brenda is happy to be here as part of this discussion.*
- B: Feel warmly to discussion that has just come up. Feel a call to be a minister of the gospel in the midst of my family life. Have the discussion around the pastoral role about the role, not about me.

Don't like the tight ass mentality of what most churches pay their pastors. Think it's a no brainer. Shouldn't pay the minimum but what peers are getting. Can we employ a second person to achieve goals Brenda is talking about.

Jeannie's comment (as absent) via Derek: Brenda does 100% but gets paid 80%

Can we clarify why the role is 80%?

Derek: Brenda originally came into the role at 80% (that what was offered) and 20% of the role was given to someone else to support this role (didn't happen), and then for the project role and now Kirsten's role.

Many thought Brenda had chosen 80% role.

Would like to see a pastoral team and male / female combo.

I prefer single person so the vision doesn't get lost.

How do we solve the problem of un-integration? If I didn't have cside as my 'compost' then I wouldn't be able to be strong here.

How much \$\$ are we talking about here? What % of increased giving do we need to give?

Understand the 80% job is not working. Feel your pain. Understand the need to have a home that functions as a home. If we can help solve this then other things may fall into place.

Acknowledge that some people here may not be able to give more. Is this a reflection of what's going on in the wider outside community? Can we peel back the stuff that we are 'doing' and then have more 'being' rather than 'doing'.

Do we need to consider a cityside house / manse?

B: being a minister is about carrying this community 24/7. full time ministry invites me to greater integration. Would feel free to do more time wise as have put boundaries up to protec the part-time space.

A motion was proposed by Fergus, then amended by discussion and resulted in:

We reaffirm our commitment to Brenda in the role of minister for Cityside and we will increas Brenda's role and remuneration (stipend, housing and allowances) from 80% to 100%, and we ask council to take all necessary steps to ensure that this happens as soon as possible.

Motion seconded by John F. Carried by majority.
