Grant opened in prayer at 10.20am.

Minutes of 2014 AGM

Moved Grant, seconded Helen Dallaston, that these be accepted as a true and accurate record. - Carried. We realised no one was taking minutes for 2015, so Ri was co-opted.

Election of Council Members

Grant and Stu explained that we have got out of step with elections, so that everybody will be due to retire at once. To get around this it was moved Stu, seconded someone:

> That we that we provide an one off exception to the normal terms of appointment for Council where incumbent Council members are appointed for a term of one year. **Carried**

Nik Brehaut and Sarah O'Brien were appointed scrutineers. Community Leaders: re-elected for one year: Helen Dallaston, Evelyn Cornes, Karen Plimmer Newly elected for two years: Holly Friis, Nicki Maplesden, Grahame Walker Management Team: re-elected for one year: Craig Drown, Saul Parkinson Newly elected for two years: Claude Dewerse

Management Team Report

Jo Nonweiler stood down during the year and Claude Dewerse was co-opted on.

Saul presented the Financial Report. We have a \$19K surplus for this year, and finally \$10K in the maintenance fund. Previously we were only scraping by, but at current levels we might expect around a \$12K surplus for the next financial year.

Increased income was due to some one-off giving and a temporary rental boost while Sustainable Solutions was a tenant. Building costs were down \$5K as no large maintenance work was done, and staffing costs are down \$12K, largely because Stu is employed at 70%.

Current paid staffing is Stu, Kirsten (ChSp coord - 12 hrs/wk), Hyunsil (admin - 12 hrs) and cleaning (3 hrs). Additionally, in summer Ri did a large amount of tidy-up work to allow Hyunsil to start.

Rental income: ArtSpace has signed for another 2-year lease upstairs; Damaris from ArtSpace has started a 6-month trial of a downstairs room for band practice; we have some downstairs storage tenants and several semi-regular building users (yoga, music teacher, a Filipino church). **Claude presented a building update.** We have a maintenance strategy focusing on the roof, painting and high use areas. This is what the \$10K maintenance fund is for.

Earthquake status: the building is earthquake prone. A proper report could cost \$30K, repairs up to \$100K. We have no financial provision for this, but we do have 20 years to reach compliance. The Baptist Union might loan funds but will not offer other financial assistance.

If anyone is aware of repair work that needs done, please let the Management Team know.

If you have experience with the building, or other expertise, and would be willing to give a second opinion or fill in some background, the Management Team would love to hear from you.

We are continuing to explore other ways to generate income from the building, such as maybe allowing ArtSpace to expand into the Xplorers' room.

Vince asked whether previous discussion on possibly converting part of the upstairs space to residential was continuing. This is still being informally discussed though not actively pursued. Auckland Council's new Unitary Plan would make it possible. Our Council would welcome anyone taking this on, but it is beyond their capabilities to follow up at present. Craig Drown has written a report on this; email him for a copy.

Future shape of Children's Space and Youth Leadership

Evelyn explained that the existing cohort structure was put in place to give us some holding time while the focus was on transitioning between ministers, but we have well outgrown the model we are working with. Also, our demographics are changing as more teens will be coming through. Additionally, Kirsten's role as ChSp coordinator will finish at the end of the year (by mutual agreement rather than contract).

Feedback and discussion so far suggests the need for a pastoral role (rather than coordinator) to oversee the new structures we put in place. The person(s) would take more leadership in the spiritual formation of the children and young people, rather than just coordinate. It was acknowledged that this would make a reality what Kirsten (and Helen B) already bring into the role.

The Baptist Union manual sets a non-registered associate pastor's salary at \$74K pa, thus \$37K if half time. We may also

need a further position (say 8 hrs/wk @ \$25 = \$10K) - a total of around \$48K. We currently spend \$12K on this area, leaving \$36K to find, some of which would come from the 30% of a full time pastor's salary that we are not paying Stu. (One of the reasons Stu chose to go part-time was to allow for co-pastoring options).

There was a question whether this would be likely to lighten Stu's load at all. He envisaged some "cross-pollination".

The following motion is intended to give Council direction to explore this more fully and work up a proper proposal. Moved Evelyn, seconded Helen Dallaston:

That Council, in communication with the community, explore the shape of a new pastoral role(s) including hours, budgetary requirement\$ and all manner of other details, and bring these findings to a Special General Meeting, likely mid-October. **Carried**.

BUNZ Fight - Baptist Union Assembly motion re same-sex marriage

Grant as chair emphasised that this is a discussion on how we vote at Assembly, not on same-sex marriage (SSM) per se. Stu presented the motion we will be asked to agree with at Baptist Assembly:

In light of the Working Party paper, Assembly Council moves:

The Baptist Union of NZ Assembly 2015 continues to uphold the sanctity of the biblical understanding of marriage understood as a lifelong commitment between a man and a woman.

Therefore, The Baptist Union of NZ Assembly 2015 agrees together that we will not conduct same sex marriages or allow our buildings to be used for same.

The issue here is that the Baptist Union (BU) doesn't have authority over churches but is a support body. Congregations are autonomous. As Baptists, we should be given freedom to see things differently from another congregation. The BU is founded by an Act of Parliament which includes 6 articles of faith, plus provision that each church can be selfdetermining in its application of scripture in its setting.

The BU introduced a definition of marriage 2 years ago at Assembly so there is no need for the first part of

this motion, except to pave the way for the second. This amounts to constitutional change by stealth, since it takes away the congregation's right to apply scripture in its own context - the "agrees together" would be binding on us.

The current issue is SSM, but it could be anything. This seems to be the first time the BU has tried to direct churches. Stu wants to see us protected as Baptists - this motion is not Baptist governance.

For this reason, the motion will almost certainly be amended at Assembly, so we need to give Stu and our other delegates direction in how to vote on our behalf, without tying their hands.

Grant reminded us that when the law was changed, Cityside discussed the potential for conducting a same-sex marriage and decided we were about 80% comfortable with the idea.

Derek noted that the Act allowing SSM contains a clause protecting people from prosecution for refusing to conduct SSM, if this "contravenes the religious beliefs of the religious body" (the BU). Therefore, part of the rationale for the BU motion will be to protect those of its members who do not agree with SSM.

Functionally, both our building and Stu's registration are held by the BU. Not all Baptist ministers are marriage celebrants, but all Baptist celebrants must be registered ministers. One option could be for Stu's registration as a celebrant to be through the registrar general, so he would remain a Baptist minister but his celebrancy role could be endorsed by the Cityside community. Stu pointed out however that he is not compelled by law to marry anyone.

Adee pointed out that the BU doesn't want to be dictated to by the state to perform SSM, but we feel the same way toward the BU's directives to us. Derek summed this up as "protection yes, restriction no", then drew up a motion for us:

> We are against any move by Assembly that restricts the autonomy of the local Baptist Church within the constitution of the Baptist Union of NZ as it currently stands.

Moved Derek, seconded Stu. Carried.

Minister's Report

Stu McGregor

Foundations

Isaiah 40 opens with the proclamation "Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God" and leads into a voice crying to the world from the wilderness, announcing a cataclysmic reordering of everything, a realignment of all things to God and God's goodness. It is a confronting reminder of God to exiles suffering an identity crisis. I suspect questions of 'who they were' and 'what they could be' were ever present but neglected by the need to 'just get on' with life. The chapter finishes with the beautiful words that are all too familiar:

> Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth.

those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

It's as powerful as when the first beatitude was spoken on the mountain one famous day early in Jesus' ministry. In the presence of 'those who should know better' Jesus declares that the 'poor in spirit' are the ones who inherit the Kingdom of Heaven.

In both cases the words of Salvation are to those that the established power base considered valueless. This is good. This is very good.

I think an important reason for why any church exists is to be the "voice crying out in the wilderness"; calling people of all kinds toward God through Jesus Christ. It's not arrogance to believe we have something to offer the spirituality of our society, in fact, it's appropriate, because that is what we do (imagine that with a 'Harvey Specter'-esque emphasis).

Questions leading to Dreams

As a minister I think a primary role is for me to speak this 'call toward God' into our faith community. It's both a priestly and prophetic role, calling us to love and worship God and also posing the timeless question Francis Schaeffer asked in the 70s, "How then should we live?"

This question is a challenge to us individually that expresses itself corporately as we work out the answer. As we form this group, this body, this New Emmanuel (if you will), as we form ourselves both as participants in the whole and also as microcosms of the whole, we also form our presence in the landscape around us (both physically and metaphorically). So another question can be asked which goes beyond the hackneyed "what makes [Church X] attractive?", but "what makes Cityside significant?" in our surroundings.

As I ponder these questions, the following ideas bubble up to the surface. I want to explore creating public worship spaces, I want to explore how we can interact with local businesses, how we can become active in social justice issues and, of course, how we can speak well into the wider Baptist movement (I write this well aware that this may require better listening too!). I would love to see us continue with campaigning against poverty in New Zealand, advocating for a different kind of discourse in society and wrestling with the ethical dilemma of 'being middle class'. I think it is important that we find another issue that we can apply the same corporate treatment and process to as we did with Marriage Equality. And I also hope for us to maintain our deep care for one another, our openness and warmheartedness, our acceptance and embrace of difference and the spaciousness for each other to live spirituality 'at our own pace and only as we can'. Both flow from and into each other.

It's my hope that as the "green shoots" we have been speaking of lately emerge, that we might be able to find or reorganise some energy to nurture our dreams and visions.

General observations

There have been some very significant shifts for Cityside in the last 12 months. We are now multi-staff, we have adopted a plan and vision from Kirsten and Helen as to how we can nurture our Children and Youth into the future, we have continued at trajectory of good, quality services with multiple input, we are establishing connection points for our older teen to twenty somethings.

Our building is starting to generate more income where the greater community sees us as a viable venue and we welcome them in— let our walls tell our story.

All in all, I think Cityside is positive and going well. The church is in good heart as shown by the content of the reports we have received, the new members we are welcoming and how newcomers are opting to stick around.

However, some challenges remain. The Governance structure I had proposed last year needs work, we are still down two Council members and we will have to work out how to continue adapting to the constant change of people in our faith community—whether that is through people maturing, coming in afresh or personal shifts in perspective. These are all quite manageable challenges though so I'm not too concerned by them.

Bullet points

Time for some quick fire bullet points then:

HIGHLIGHTS

Visitation and coffees. CafeTwenty Three ought to be giving me discounts by now :) I have had nearly 100 meetings/ catchups with Citysiders and many other incidental ones. I enjoy our conversations and look forward to many more you are such a pleasure to meet with! Thank you!

Advent in Art and the Christmas Eve service. Once again this tradition of ours was a beautiful and thoughtful time with Kate K, Grahame W and Michelle P/EBGBs sharing with us. Nigel's co-ordination of it all was outstanding and our SATB choir were awesome.

Morning tea: I've long thought that how a church chats after a service is an indicator of how well the community is connecting. I love the buzz afterwards. Having said that, I also recognise that this can be the most difficult time of the Sunday morning for some and it's always good for us to make an effort to include those who are on the fringes of conversation.

Danny's coffee cart: So proud of you Danny :) It's been great to watch your dream become a reality.

Serving with outstanding people on Council: The hard work that has gone into the way Cityside provides leadership and process is enormously beneficial. To have inherited a functioning, open and transparent model has made my transition into the role of minister both smooth and supportive. I am grateful for the wisdom that this group shows in working for the best outcomes for us all. I have also felt well cared for and supported with my own personal circumstances. Thank you.

Good Friday and Ash Wednesday services: It was nice to work with Fergus on some quieter and more creative services (always so much to learn after about mixing oil and ash....sigh). But these were great and I hope to provide more services like these in the future.

Easter Partnership with Ponsonby Baptist Church: This was an unexpected surprise as Jody offered her help for Easter. As we talked we realised we could share our resources and looked at six stations of the cross. This worked remarkably well, both for us as ministers, but also for those who had prepared sermons/ reflections being able to use the material at each church. The sharing of our talents was actually quite special. On top of that, it proved to be quite interesting to look at the stations through spoken word. I'm grateful for the many insights that were shared and also for the opportunity to preach on Easter Sunday morning (which is definitely a personal high point).

Hyunsil's administrative magic: Hyunsil deserves accolades for keeping things running on the admin side of things. How she manages to keep on top of so many things is nothing short of a miracle in my mind. Thank you Hyunsil.

Church Camp: I've written elsewhere about how cool this experience was for me, AJ and the church. It was nice to hang out with everyone and relive a bit of lost youth on the waterslides and music videos. It was a lot of fun and I am grateful to Helen B for making it happen.

Our curators: With me needing to pull back a bit, these wonderful people have really stepped up to the mark and have created a consistently high level of services for us. The thoughtfulness and the humility with which they have taken time to shape the services is not lost on me and nor is it lost on visitors who come to our church. Thank you!

Damaris becoming our hiring agent: I enjoy working with Damaris and we're starting to see the building get more use since she was engaged as our "hiring agent". We have her to thank too for the AV gear in the hall and those whopping big cupboards for putting the chairs in. I'm grateful for her integrity and desire to see our community do well.

LOWLIGHTS

Baptist Assembly 2016: To say I was disappointed with the outcome of the resolutions on Same Sex Marriage that were passed at Assembly is an understatement. We knew they were unconstitutional, we told people this and still, 4/5 of our movement voted for them anyway. Really disappointing and draining on emotional resources — for what in the end amounts to nothing. Now that we have a legal opinion from Mai Chen supporting our argument that the resolutions were

unconstitutional, the issue is now prolonged and even more energy will need to be invested by the churches in what should have been done and dusted by now. It's a tragic waste of time, money and resources. I'd love to see Assembly become a forum for trying to address the bigger issues in the world i.e. instead of forming a corporate response to Same Sex Marriage, why not be addressing bicultural concerns in New Zealand, inequality, climate change, denominational decline or even have a robust debate about how much benefit charismatic expressions of faith have been to our spiritual health. (Rant pending!)

I won't be attending this year for personal reasons but I have to say, it's not actually that inspiring.

The impact of my personal circumstances: It's been hard having to put some stuff on the back-burner for a bit while I try and work through things with my family. I often reflect during our benediction about how dreams and visions have been gifted to us, yet . . . life happens and they just seem to be beyond our grasp. It's frustrating to have to just let some things go but alas, we can only do what we can do. I've been frustrated too with how my head capacity has been full and I've not followed up on some things. It will improve of course, but I've got to wade through mud first.

Sickness, death and general sadness among us: I know it's a fact of life, but it still sucks to see what life throws at people. It's such a hard road for many of you and I wish it weren't so. I have a great deal of respect for how our community works together behind the scenes to care for one another. I am also grateful that many of you have allowed me in to share with your journey. Every Friday I light around 30 candles for various prayer needs and people, and I'm often struck with an ironic sense of the weight each flame represents. It's a privilege to be praying for you.

Seeds for the future

The Children and Youth programmes continue to be "second to none" in my opinion and we will continue working hard to integrate the teenagers into the community more.

I still have a concern for the historical treatment of Māori and some of the attitudes from non-Maori towards this. I've begun reconnecting with Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei and joined the Tamaki Treaty Workers group (thanks to Natasha Hofmans/Allan). Next year I have signed up to an introduction to Te Reo course and if there are others who want to join me, let me know. It is one of the big issues for New Zealand and I would like for us to develop an effectual voice both as a church and as a wider community.

We are maintaining our voice with the wider Baptist movement in the sense of holding the Baptist Union to account on Marriage Equality. This is significant because it is my hope that we can help our movement to talk about the wider and more significant issues outlined above.

Next year I'd like to explore some public worship events around Easter. I'd like to set up a labyrinth in a public space (Mission Bay?) and also do something interesting using the outside of our buildings—Kirsten's citrus garden is a terrific example where one day passersby may pick some juicy fruit from the trees that are growing there. On Easter Sunday we I dream of having hundreds of helium balloons tied around the building for people to take away. I would like to put a blackboard or some other mechanism outside for anyone to request prayer.

Those are some thoughts at the moment, put into a container that you can put your thoughts into too.

Children and Youth Annual Report, 2016

Kahikatea tū i te uru The kahikatea tree stands in groves – there is strength in being together.

Kahikatea trees are magnificent. They don't usually thrive alone however, because although they are very tall trees they don't have deep roots and so they are vulnerable to storms. They need to grow in groves, where their roots intertwine and form a solid mat under the ground, providing mutual support. Together, they can grow straight and tall into forest giants.

This whakataukī can be a word-picture of the importance of our Cityside church community to all of us, and especially as an environment for nurturing the growth and development of our children and youth.

Why we do what we do

The things we plan for our children and youth at Cityside are designed to deepen connection with God, self and others. We aim for a spiritual formation ethos, where we are giving opportunity and support for children and youth to develop their own relationship with God and God's family at Cityside Baptist Church.

Highlights

This year we launched the new grouping structure that was proposed in 2015, and it seems to have been working well for most of our children and youth. The aim was to have defined yet fuzzy transition stages, different groupings for different purposes, and plenty of overlaps between groupings to promote intergenerational relationship.

Sunday mornings:

Quest and Odyssey (5-13 year olds)

Much, much gratefulness to the C&Y curators who put such a lot of thought and time into preparing Sunday morning sessions: Christina, Hayley, Helen B, Isa, Mark P, Michelle P, Sarah H and Shannon; and also to all the fabulous Citysiders who support as rostered helpers. Recent topic highlights include Narnian themes of forgiveness and choices, 'Life-changing meetings with Jesus', our Lenten gratitude practice and this term's Examen practice. We're presently exploring David Csinos' spiritual styles – how different people connect to God through word, emotion, space/symbol, and action/social justice.

Matrix (13-18 year olds)

Super exciting to be part of our lovely teens' lives and their growth, and for us as Citysiders to get to journey with them and both give to them and receive from them. This couldn't happen as well as it does without Helen B's loving and wise guidance, and all that she does to support this age-group in their lives and spiritual formation, and to help them connect with each other and other Citysiders.

Xplorers (2-5 year olds)

Our challenge with this group is that there are often only 2 or 3 children present on a Sunday. However, we have a keen team of teenage leaders who are very committed to demonstrating that our Under 5s are important to us at Cityside and to building relationship with them, even if there's only one child there. Thank you to Cara, David, Isaac, Jess, John, Michelle B, Mikayla, Rose, and Theo, and also to Caspian and Mitchel who have been training for the moment they turn 14. Thank you also to Evelyn, Esther, Shannon and Jo who have been helping with preparing creative response activities this year since we didn't find a full-time Xplorers facilitator as hoped, and to the other Xplorer parents for your support of your children on Sundays.

Not on Sunday mornings:

Fusion (15 to 20-somethings)

Ali and Adee launched Fusion in April, and this group meets weekly, usually on a Thursday evening. Adee and Ali have organised a variety of Citysiders to share their expertise in topics as diverse as Myers-Briggs and Enneagram, reflective and body spiritual practices, Science and Faith, and Love and Intimacy, as well as a range of social connection events. Ali has been facilitating the gatherings since Adee has been unwell.

Much gratefulness to Adee and Ali for the valuable gift of the container they offer our older teens and 20-somethings week after week, and to everyone else who has been involved in filling that container with fabulousness.

Connect (Year 6 at school upwards)

Connect meets on a Friday several times a term, and is one of my favourite groups of people to hang out with. Highlights the past year have been: camping at Ambury Farm, The Amazing Race involving train rides and running all around Cityside's neighbourhood, making music videos and candles, pool parties, games nights, Solstice up Maungawhau, and a visit to Hogwarts. Gratitude to Mark P who co-leads with me, and to Hayley and all the other people who help out so generously.

Kinetic (Year 1-6 children)

Kinetic has been led by Cara, and it has been great for this group of children to have events organised especially for them by someone they so much admire and love. It's important our children spend time together outside Sunday mornings if they are to develop friendships. That is difficult with our wide-spread community, so what Cara facilitates is very valuable. Much appreciation to the parents who also support the events with transport, supervision, venue provision and pack down help. Event highlights include: pyjama parties and a pool party and visits to Butterfly Creek and Jump.

Waypoint Sunday Evening Services

Waypoint services are twice a term, and have three main aims: to provide an intergenerational meeting point between contemplative and connective aspects of communal worship; to provide an opportunity for our talented teenage musos to develop something of their own to share; and to provide opportunities for Citysiders to share their stories with each other about how they are doing life. I've been enjoying experimenting with service elements, particularly including a meal as part of the service arc.

Huge thanks to everyone whose contributions have gone into Waypoints, and particularly to Mark P, Helen B and Hyunsil who underpin a lot of the organisational load, and to Cara, John, Michelle B and Rose who have been blessing us with their music.

Kia ora

I feel very grateful and privileged to have been appointed with Helen B in February as an Associate Pastor to help facilitate all the above into being, alongside so many wonderful people. I am grateful for being paid for 12 hours per week which means I can focus time and energy that I wouldn't have otherwise to this role – I know that this gift from Citysiders is precious, as is the trust and willingness to be open and vulnerable with our lives as together we seek connection with God, ourselves and each other.

The Children and Youth Planning Team are a powerhouse of wisdom and creative energy: please pray for them and express your gratitude directly to them, as much of what they collectively hold and do may be out of the public eye but it is a vital part of our church community. The C&Y Planning Team are Hayley, Helen B, Hyunsil, Isa, Mark P, Michelle P, Sarah H and Shannon.

Mark P, Helen B and Hyunsil – you are all three of you wonderful and it is a joy to do all this with each of you. Thank you for all the times you notice and seebeneath and take action, so graciously and generously.

Much appreciation to Stu and Council for all their support of things C&Y and me. Your holding of the whole is so important and appreciated.

And to all Citysiders: thank you for every time that you notice and include and connect with a child or youth; you are demonstrating God's love for them and weaving them into our community of faith. Thank you too for every time that you are open to receive from them what they offer to our community.

An opportunity for us

I would love us to view Sunday morning teas as part of the arc of the service.

We begin our services by gathering all together in the auditorium and worshiping together, intergenerationally. We then usually transition with many people moving to different parts of the building and we continue the service in different rooms in ways suited to different ages and stages – we're not physically in one room together but we're still all part of and doing church. My hope is that morning tea could be a more intentional re-gathering together and an intergenerational book-ending of the service for us all.

I know the transition to a different room can be jarring if you feel established and safe in the auditorium, and that going into the hall is particularly intimidating for newcomers. However, the reasons we usually have morning tea in the hall are important too, and for me they are mainly around being inclusive: the hall is an environment that is more tolerant of a range of activity levels and needs, where younger members of our community have things to do and can be supervised without their parents missing out on interacting with other Citysiders when they may already have felt segregated for much of the service; the people providing the hospitality aren't excluded by being stuck in an unseen room doing dishes; and it gives the people who have been in the auditorium the whole time so far an opportunity for insight into what other Citysiders have been doing because they can see and talk with children and the leaders about the response stations in the hall. If everyone makes the effort to move sometime during the service, either when the C&Y programmes begin or when morning tea begins, it sends the message that all of us are willing to accommodate the needs of others at different points, because we are all important.

So here's my invitation to you...

How might you approach morning tea differently if you saw it as the regathering third-part of the service? Could it be an opportunity to demonstrate our valuing of the Body of Christ re-gathered together, and an opportunity to connect with, in addition to your usual friends...

- a newcomer or someone you haven't met yet by inviting them to join you as you walk to the hall?
- a child or youth by asking about what they did during the second part of the service?
- a person standing awkwardly alone or doing the dishes by themselves (because we all hate being that person)?

No reira, mā te Atua e manaaki. May the hospitality of God enfold you.

Financial state of the Nation Community

We're in rude health aye! Actually, we're doing OK. There's a couple of pages of numbers attached if you care to look, but here's 3 key points

- We ended with a surplus of \$19,000, same as last year.
- We have \$60,000 set aside for building maintenance. If you look at our bank account and see loadsa cash, think "new roof", not "shopping!"
- The big expense is salaries. The year just finished only had 5 months of Kirsten and Helen working more. Stu has indicated he wants to stay at 70% (was going to drop to 60%). These changes mean that for the current year if income stays the same we will about break even or have a small deficit, rather than making the surplus of the last two years.

Other stuff

It would be nice to be able to spend a bit more on salaries. One person in particular does far more than she's paid for.

Rental income is stable. The Artspace lease has another year to run. Damaris has done a good job of expanding her role to include the band space downstairs and acting as a space rental manager. This is squashing us a little at times when booking clash with our own plans. We need to have a good discussion in the coming year to work out how we prioritise our own use of the space with the good we can do with the extra income from renting the space out.

We almost got through this without mentioning Health and Safety—it's meant some added expenses, but the main cost has been time. Lotsa time.


